Collect

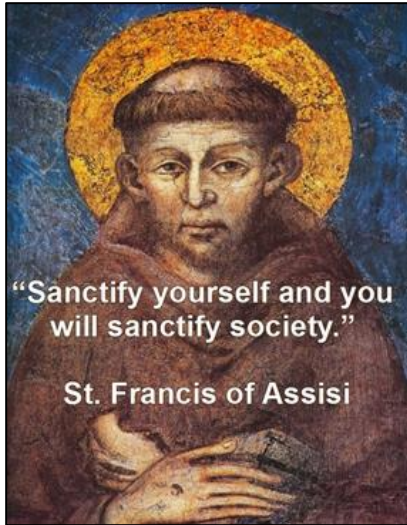
Almighty ever-living God, who in the abundance of your kindness surpass the merits and the desires of those who entreat you, pour out your mercy upon us to pardon what conscience dreads and to give what prayer does not dare to ask.

Prayer over the Offerings

Accept, O Lord, we pray, the sacrifices instituted by your commands and, through the sacred mysteries, which we celebrate with dutiful service, graciously complete the sanctifying work by which you are pleased to redeem us. Through Christ our Lord.

Prayer after Communion

Grant us, almighty God, that we may be refreshed and nourished by the Sacrament which we have received, so as to be transformed into what we consume. Through Christ our Lord.



This past week there was another tragic shooting in our country. As a nation we are forced to once again mourn the numerous people killed and injured. As I reflect on this and all the violent episodes that have happened in our country and around the world I am reminded of two quotes one from St. Francis of Assisi whose feast day we celebrated this past week: *“Sanctify yourself and you will sanctify society.”* The other from Pope Emeritus Benedict: *“each of us is called to change the world, to work for a culture of life, a culture forged by love and respect for the dignity of each human person”*

During this Respect Life Month these thoughts remind me that I have a responsibility to respect life, to treat each person with the dignity they deserve, in my thoughts, in my words and in my actions. While it may seem like too little in the face of such great tragedy; it is only by each of us, as individuals, striving to live the the sanctity and holiness that we are called to that we can begin to change a culture of death into the Lord’s Culture of Life.

We must remember the words of the Easter Exsultet that we hear as we remember the darkest moment of human history the death of Christ and rejoice that Christ has overcome even sin and death: “glowing fire ignites for God’s honor, a fire divided, yet never dimmed by the sharing of its light.” In these moments of darkness each of us must strive to live the light of our faith knowing as St. Francis said “all the darkness in the world cannot extinguish the light of a single candle.”

I would like to share with you the words of Bishop Joseph Pepe, the Bishop of Las Vegas

I am grateful to all who have come together to pray tonight. In the face of tragedy, we need each other. And in the face of violence we stand together because we cannot let hate and violence have the last word.

We gather from all faiths and walks of life. We pray and sing and listen to the Word of God to remind ourselves that amidst this tragedy God is with us. God cries with our tears, and as the Scripture you have heard tonight says *“For I know the plans that I have for you,”* declares the LORD, *‘plans for wellbeing, and not for calamity, in order to give you a future and a hope.’* (Jeremiah 29)

We come together in unity across our religious traditions, across race, across gender to stand with each other as living signs of that hope. I am struck by the signs of goodness even in the face of violence. I think about the first responders who risked their own lives to save the lives of others. I think of the emergency medical personnel and hospital staff members who answered the call for well-being and a future by using their skills to save lives. And, I am reminded that the many individuals, who rendered aid, gave rides and helped each other. They are living reminders of the Good Samaritan and God who calls us all from fear to care.

And tonight as we gather to pray for healing and unity in our community of Las Vegas, I am reminded of all the places throughout the world who suffer daily violence. We must find ways to work together to bring about healing in our world so that none of God’s children have to suffer what we have suffered.

We stand together tonight to witness that all humans are made in the image and likeness of God, and as God’s children they have their fundamental human dignity. In all that we do we need to remember that as our starting place. In a world that is increasingly polarized we need to be a countersign. Where there is hatred and violence we must be the sign of love and of peace. Where there is division and uncivil speech, we must stand together as a sign of unity. And where we stand in a world of despair, we must stand together as a sign of hope.

The summary of religious life we find in Scripture: *Love the Lord your God with your whole heart, your whole mind and your whole soul and love your neighbor as yourself.* How will we do that? It begins by gathering together in unity, prayer and love. And it continues in the actions of our everyday lives, not allowing ourselves to remain silent in the face of hate, not consenting by our apathy to the persecution of others, but working to know one another, to care for each other, and to show by our actions that we love each other.
